WHEREAS; recognized during the month of February, Black History Month is a celebration of the countless contributions of Black Americans throughout the state and nation’s history, as well as an opportunity to reflect on and recognize the collective struggle for full citizenship, equity, inclusion, and justice that Black Americans have endured and continue to endure to this day; and

WHEREAS; as designated by the Association for the Study of African American Life and History, this year’s Black History Month theme is “A Century of Black History Commemorations,” highlighting the origins and 100 year progression of this annual observance and inviting Americans to reflect on how a century of commemoration has shaped the understanding of the lives, identities, and contributions of Black Americans; and

WHEREAS; reflecting on the collective past of the state and nation, it is clear that the experiences, crimes, and struggles of our ancestors cannot be separated from modern history, and that many of the injustices and inequities that Black Americans have historically endured have nevertheless remained deeply entrenched in U.S. culture and institutions; and

WHEREAS; during Black History Month and every month, the state of Wisconsin reaffirms its commitment to working alongside community leaders and activists to build a future that is more just, fair, and equitable and that works for everyone, celebrates everyone, and welcomes everyone, and to find strength in unity to overcome the divides and disparities that so often hold communities back; and


