WHEREAS; according to Johns Hopkins Medicine, approximately 200,000 people in the United States are impacted by Marfan syndrome; and

WHEREAS; while advances in medicine have improved management of the condition, the number and severity of symptoms can differ significantly among affected individuals, resulting in Marfan syndrome often being misdiagnosed or underdiagnosed, which can delay timely treatments that are essential to ensuring affected individuals have a satisfactory quality of life; and


