

WHEREAS; the safety of farm and agricultural workers across Wisconsin is of the utmost importance to the state; and

WHEREAS; grain production, handling, and transportation are significant industries in Wisconsin and across the United States, but it can be dangerous work, as it takes only seconds to be engulfed in flowing grain or overcome by oxygen-deficient environments that can result in suffocation and even death; and

WHEREAS; according to research conducted by Purdue University, over the past 60 years, there have been over 2,300 cases of grain engulfment reported in the United States, with a fatality rate of approximately 58 percent, underscoring the importance of increased training and public awareness to help prevent situations where engulfment might occur and reduce the number of preventable injuries and deaths due to grain handling and storage; and

WHEREAS; practicing preventative and corrective safety measures, including maintenance of grain bin equipment, not walking over grain, utilizing harness and lifeline systems, employing bin observers, and testing the air for sufficient oxygen, can be essential to saving lives; and

WHEREAS; observed annually during the third full week in February, this week, the state of Wisconsin joins the state's grain operators, farmers, and all agricultural workers in promoting education and awareness of the hazards associated with grain handling and storage, as well as safe work practices on farms and in commercial grain handling facilities;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tony Evers, Governor of the State of Wisconsin,

throughout the State of Wisconsin and I commend this observance
to all our state's residents.
