WHEREAS; bleeding disorders are a group of conditions in which the body is unable to form a proper blood clot, resulting in extended bleeding after trauma, injury, menstruation, and surgery that can be severely debilitating—and even fatal—if not treated effectively; and

WHEREAS; initially designated as Hemophilia Awareness Month in 1986, Bleeding Disorders Awareness Month has been nationally redesignated by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services since 2016 to reflect the wide range of bleeding and blood conditions—from hemophilia and von Willebrand Disease to anemia, HIV, and more; and

WHEREAS; according to the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, millions of individuals in the United States are living with a bleeding disorder, including 1.6 million women and girls, many of whom are undiagnosed, demonstrating the need for greater research and awareness surrounding these disorders; and

WHEREAS; this month, the state of Wisconsin joins advocacy and health organizations, hematologists, medical professionals, and affected individuals and families around the state in celebrating the advances made in treating bleeding disorders while recognizing the need for greater engagement from researchers, policymakers, and community members to develop better treatments and an eventual cure;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tony Evers, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, do hereby proclaim March 2025 as

BLEEDING DISORDERS AWARENESS MONTH

throughout the State of Wisconsin and I commend this observance to all our state's residents.
