

WHEREAS; according to research in the National Library of Medicine, endosalpingiosis is a rare disease characterized by the ectopic presence of fallopian tube-like tissue outside of the fallopian tube; and

WHEREAS; while the prevalence of endosalpingiosis is difficult to establish because it can only be diagnosed through surgical biopsy, countless women in the United States are affected; and

WHEREAS; women living with endosalpingiosis often carry a large share of the burden of finding a medical expert, funding research, and raising public awareness to support research into effective and affordable treatments; and

WHEREAS; the health and prosperity of Wisconsin is dependent on the health and prosperity of women, and investing in, protecting, and supporting women's health, as well as ensuring that every woman has access to quality healthcare, must be a top priority; and

WHEREAS; this month, the state of Wisconsin honors those whose lives have been affected by endosalpingiosis and joins patients, activists, and organizations in spreading awareness of endosalpingiosis and embracing hope that advancements in science and medicine will soon lead to a deeper understanding of the disease, earlier diagnoses, and new treatments to enhance affected individuals' quality of life;

ENDOSALPINGIOSIS AWARENESS MONTH


throughout the State of Wisconsin and I commend this observance
