WHEREAS; whether it is in the workplace, at school, at home, or anywhere else, sexual violence is a pervasive issue in communities across the state, nation, and world, as nearly half of women and approximately one in four men have experienced sexual violence at some point in their lives; and

WHEREAS; according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, approximately one in four girls and one in 20 boys in the United States experience sexual abuse before the age of 18, and sexual harassment and assault remain a serious concern on college campuses nationwide with the Association of American University's Climate Survey on Sexual Assault and Misconduct reporting that around one in four women undergraduates and nearly seven percent of undergraduate men experience sexual assault during their time in college; and

WHEREAS; sexual violence can happen to anyone and anywhere, but LGBTQ individuals and communities of color face disproportionately higher rates of sexual assault, underscoring the need for efforts to address sexual violence to also include efforts to address systemic racism, misogyny, homophobia, transphobia, and all forms of interpersonal and institutionalized oppression; and

WHEREAS; critical programs and resources to support victims and survivors of sexual violence, including mental health resources, helplines, and community-based advocacy programs, help to provide critical trauma-informed services, advocacy, education, and resources, and it is imperative that these resources and the providers that offer this vital care receive the support they need to provide for victims, survivors, and their families; and

WHEREAS; the theme of this year's Sexual Assault Awareness Month, "Together We Act, United We Change," encourages individuals, communities, organizations, and institutions across the state and country to come together to address, prevent, and raise awareness of sexual abuse, assault, and harassment so that all individuals may live in a safe and supportive environment; and

WHEREAS; this month, the state of Wisconsin honors and joins all victims and survivors of sexual violence, advocates, and dedicated organizations in raising awareness of the prevalence of sexual violence, expanding access to preventative education, and calling on leaders and policymakers to implement and enforce systems and laws that support survivors and that ensure justice and accountability;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tony Evers, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, do hereby proclaim April 2025 as

SEXUAL ASSAULT AWARENESS MONTH

throughout the State of Wisconsin and I commend this observance to all our state's residents.
