

WHEREAS; Sjögren’s disease is a serious and systemic autoimmune disease that affects an individual’s ability to effectively regulate body moisture, causing excessive and unusual dryness; and

WHEREAS; Sjögren’s affects the eyes, mouth, vascular system, lungs, kidneys, skin, nervous system, and reproductive system, while also causing other serious complications, such as profound fatigue, joint pain, skin rashes, and most commonly, dry mouth and eyes; and

WHEREAS; currently, there are millions of Americans living with Sjögren’s disease, including many in Wisconsin, making it one of the most common rheumatic autoimmune diseases in the United States; and

WHEREAS; while anyone can develop Sjögren’s disease, the cause remains unknown, and there is no single test to diagnose the disease, emphasizing the need for more research and clinical trials to understand the pathology of the disease and the efficacy of certain therapies to treat it; and

WHEREAS; as there is currently no known cure, treatment is often centered around symptom management and prevention, and individuals living with Sjögren’s disease and their families often carry a large share of the burden in finding a medical expert, funding research, and raising public awareness; and


