WHEREAS; since its designation by the World Federation of Hemophilia in 1989, World Hemophilia Day has been recognized annually on April 17 as a day to foster greater awareness and understanding of hemophilia and all other bleeding disorders; and

WHEREAS; bleeding disorders—including hemophilia and von Willebrand disease, which are two of the most common—are characterized by the inability to form a proper blood clot in affected individuals, leading to extended bleeding after injury, surgery, trauma, or menstruation; and

WHEREAS; bleeding disorders impact millions of individuals nationwide and can lead to significant morbidity or even death if not treated effectively; and

WHEREAS; it is important to recognize that individuals with bleeding disorders depend on the safety of the blood supply and blood products, and while, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the U.S. blood supply is the safest it has ever been, continued work is needed to advocate for the increased reliability and safety of blood and blood products; and

WHEREAS; today, the state of Wisconsin joins individuals affected by hemophilia, von Willebrand disease, and all bleeding disorders in raising awareness of these conditions, fostering a greater sense of community among individuals with bleeding disorders, and working together to improve access to treatment and care, emphasizing better control and prevention of bleeds;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tony Evers, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, do hereby proclaim April 17, 2024, as

WORLD HEMOPHILIA DAY

throughout the State of Wisconsin, and I commend this observance to all our state's residents.
