Proclamation

WHEREAS; since its designation by the World Federation of Hemophilia in 1989, World Hemophilia Day has been recognized annually on April 17 to help foster greater awareness and understanding of hemophilia and all other bleeding disorders; and

WHEREAS; bleeding disorders—including hemophilia and von Willebrand disease, which are two of the most common disorders—are characterized by the inability to form a proper blood clot in affected individuals, leading to extended bleeding after injury, surgery, trauma, or menstruation; and

WHEREAS; bleeding disorders impact millions of individuals nationwide and can lead to significant morbidity or even death if not treated effectively; and

WHEREAS; it is important to recognize that individuals with bleeding disorders depend on the safety and availability of the blood supply, transfusions, and blood products, and that a single blood donation has the potential to help save up to three lives; and

WHEREAS; today, the state of Wisconsin joins individuals affected by hemophilia, von Willebrand disease, and all bleeding disorders in raising awareness of these conditions, fostering a greater sense of community among individuals with bleeding disorders, working together to improve access to treatment and care, and emphasizing better control and prevention of bleeds;


NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tony Evers, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, do hereby proclaim April 17, 2026, as

WORLD HEMOPHILIA DAY


throughout the State of Wisconsin, and I commend this observance to all our state's residents.
