

WHEREAS; according to Cleveland Clinic, Ehlers-Danlos syndromes (EDS) represent several genetic disorders involving mutations in connective tissue, and each type of EDS has its own set of symptoms with variations, including joint hypermobility, skin hyperextensibility, tissue fragility, and more; and

WHEREAS; further, hypermobility spectrum disorders (HSD) are connective tissue disorders that cause joint hypermobility, instability, injury, and pain, and they are commonly associated with rare medical conditions such as EDS; and

WHEREAS; there are 13 types of EDS, and it is estimated that at least one in 5,000 individuals worldwide has the condition; and

WHEREAS; while both EDS and HSD have no known treatment or cure, early and accurate diagnosis helps to allow medical professionals to create life-saving medical plans to ensure a quality of life for people living with EDS or HSD; and

WHEREAS; a network of EDS and HSD support groups in Wisconsin helps connect those handling life with these disorders, provides resources to medical professionals, and offers hope and healing to those affected by the condition and their families; and

WHEREAS; this month, the state of Wisconsin joins dedicated advocates and organizations statewide in raising awareness of EDS and HSD to further educate and support medical research that will lead to the development of treatments and a cure;
