WHEREAS; according to Cleveland Clinic, there are several types of OI, and different classifications are used based on the severity of the disease or the nature of the underlying gene defect; and

WHEREAS; while there is no cure or prevention for the condition, most individuals living with OI can lead healthy, productive lives with proper treatment and supportive care to minimize fractures, reduce bone fragility, and maximize independent function; and

WHEREAS; increased funding for education and research surrounding OI is needed to help find more effective treatments; and

WHEREAS; this week, the state of Wisconsin joins affected individuals and their families, along with dedicated advocates, medical professionals, and organizations across the state, in spreading awareness of OI;
