

WHEREAS; Alzheimer’s disease is a progressive and debilitating condition that causes the deterioration of brain cells, which results in the symptoms of dementia, including memory loss, confusion, and loss of other cognitive abilities that seriously impact daily life; and

WHEREAS; according to the Alzheimer’s Association, over 7 million Americans and over 110,000 Wisconsinites aged 65 and older are living with Alzheimer’s disease, and the number of people diagnosed with the disease in Wisconsin is only expected to increase; and

WHEREAS; Alzheimer’s disease is the fifth-leading cause of death among people age 65 and older in the United States, and while there is currently no cure, certain treatments are available that may decelerate the disease’s progression, and help affected individuals and their caregivers improve overall quality of life; and

WHEREAS; the impact of Alzheimer's disease extends beyond the individual diagnosed, as the Alzheimer’s Association estimates that there are currently more than 200,000 unpaid and familial caregivers in Wisconsin, providing a total of 322 million hours of care to those living with Alzheimer’s and other dementias at an approximate value of over \$7 billion; and

WHEREAS; researchers in Wisconsin and worldwide are working tirelessly to advance scientific discoveries in the fight against Alzheimer’s disease, including identifying modifiable risk factors, developing earlier and more precise diagnostic tools, improving treatments to slow progression, and accelerating the search for a cure, all while advancing care models that improve quality of life for individuals and their families; and

WHEREAS; First Lady Kathy Evers has made raising awareness of Alzheimer’s disease and dementia a priority of her work and, in 2019, worked with the Aging and Disability Resource Center of Dane County to help the Wisconsin Executive Residence achieve official designation as a dementia-friendly space for all who visit, increasing visibility on the creation of dementia-friendly spaces; and

WHEREAS; this month, the state of Wisconsin joins all who are currently living with Alzheimer’s disease, their loved ones, their caregivers, and dedicated individuals and organizations across the state in encouraging continued research and funding efforts and in embracing hope for the development of new and innovative approaches to address Alzheimer’s disease and ultimately, find a cure;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tony Evers, Governor of the State of Wisconsin,
