

WHEREAS; according to Cleveland Clinic, dyspraxia, also known as developmental coordination disorder (DCD), is a chronic condition that begins in childhood and causes difficulties with motor skills and coordination; and

WHEREAS; Cleveland Clinic further estimates that the condition is relatively common, affecting approximately six percent of school-aged children; and

WHEREAS; most often diagnosed in the developmental period of childhood, symptoms of dyspraxia can vary greatly and commonly include difficulty with balancing, walking, writing, getting dressed and other daily activities, restlessness, and more, all of which can persist into adulthood; and

WHEREAS; although signs and symptoms of dyspraxia often present at a young age, diagnosis is complicated, frequently requiring a team of pediatric care professionals to assess fine motor skills, coordination, and balance while ruling out other potential causes of motor difficulties; and

WHEREAS; today, the state of Wisconsin commends those living with dyspraxia for their resilience and joins all affected individuals and their families, along with dedicated advocates and organizations across the state, in raising awareness of dyspraxia;
