

WHEREAS; Wisconsin is a state that boasts a wide variety of unique natural resources, from expansive wetlands and ancient beds of wild rice to historic forests, clean air, and vibrant tallgrass prairies; and

WHEREAS; traditions of caring for these natural resources are rooted in the cultural practices of Indigenous people, and the Native Nations that call Wisconsin home are the original stewards of the land, air, and water of the state; and

WHEREAS; Indigenous environmentalists and environmental entities, including renowned Wisconsin activists Walter Bresette and Joe Rose, Mike Tribble, the Great Lakes Indian Fish & Wildlife Commission, the Wisconsin Tribal Conservation Advisory Council, and countless others, have all played a significant part in the state’s long history of environmental stewardship and preservation; and

WHEREAS; the state of Wisconsin and Native Nations continue to work together to prioritize the sustainable cultivation of healthy terrestrial and aquatic ecosystems and to ensure that the Earth and resources utilized for food, recreation, and spiritual retreat are protected and respected; and

WHEREAS; Wisconsin proudly reaffirms its commitment to working with Native Nations to foster a better understanding of climate change and to develop solutions that will lead to the preservation of cultural resources, along with improved ecosystem function and means of sustainable food production; and

WHEREAS; the state of Wisconsin recognizes Native Nations’ dedication to food sovereignty, rooted in a deep respect for land and water resources, and remains committed to protecting the ability of Tribal communities to produce and prepare food through traditional means of harvesting, fishing, hunting, and gathering, exemplified by the formation of the state’s new Wild Rice Stewardship Council, and to give young people the opportunity to be involved in generational traditions by learning about the practices of their ancestors; and

WHEREAS; the state of Wisconsin pledges to respect Tribal sovereignty and the rights of Native Nations, and recommits to meaningful, thoughtful partnerships, listening to and understanding concerns and ideas, and collectively caring for Wisconsin’s environment and natural resources for generations to come;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tony Evers, Governor of the State of Wisconsin,
do hereby proclaim July 2026 as
