WHEREAS; modern ombuds are impartial, independent, and confidential conflict management professionals, working to address both systemic and individual issues outside of and complementary to formal conflict resolution channels like human resources, grievances, complaints, and legal action; and

WHEREAS; ombuds work in a wide variety of organizations, from universities and colleges to government at all levels to healthcare and financial institutions to corporations, not-for-profit organizations, the media, and international organizations; and

WHEREAS; by providing valued forms of alternative risk management and dispute resolution, ombuds programs are an essential supplement to formal conflict management and offer a significant service to the constituents and institutions they work with; and

WHEREAS; today, the state of Wisconsin highlights the value that ombuds bring to the organizations and constituents they serve and encourages all Wisconsinites to become familiar with the ombuds profession and to make use of these essential services as needed;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tony Evers, Governor of the State of Wisconsin,
do hereby proclaim October 12 2023 as

to all our state’s residents.
