

WHEREAS; polio is an infectious, debilitating, and potentially life-threatening disease that was once endemic across much of the world but can now be prevented through immunization; and

WHEREAS; while the World Health Organization estimates that polio cases have dropped by over 99 percent since 1988, recent detections of the virus, including in the United States, serve as a reminder that total eradication of the disease has not yet been reached and underscore the importance of every adult and child receiving the polio vaccine; and

WHEREAS; all Wisconsinites can protect themselves from polio through vaccination, and most adults who were vaccinated as a kid are protected through adulthood; and


WHEREAS; on this occasion, the state of Wisconsin reaffirms its commitment to providing programs and services that lower barriers to preventative healthcare, including vaccinations, and encourages all Wisconsinites to support the fight for a polio-free world;

WORLD POLIO DAY


throughout the State of Wisconsin and I commend this observance
