

WHEREAS; according to Cleveland Clinic, Alpha-1 antitrypsin deficiency (Alpha-1) is a progressive genetic condition that can cause damage to the lungs and liver; and

WHEREAS; common lung symptoms of Alpha-1 often include shortness of breath, wheezing, chronic cough, extreme tiredness, and frequent chest colds, and common symptoms of liver disease caused by Alpha-1 may include jaundice, itchy skin, leg or abdominal swelling, or throwing up blood; and

WHEREAS; research suggests that Alpha-1 often goes undiagnosed or misdiagnosed and that the majority of those with the disorder are unaware of their condition; and

WHEREAS; early diagnosis and treatment of Alpha-1 are associated with better disease outcomes and quality of life, highlighting the importance of greater awareness and improved research and detection of the disease; and

WHEREAS; this month, the state of Wisconsin joins all affected individuals, their loved ones, and dedicated healthcare professionals, advocates, and organizations across the state in spreading awareness of Alpha-1 in the hopes that further awareness and education will lead to earlier diagnoses, improved treatments and outcomes, and a cure;
