Proclamation

WHEREAS; epilepsy is a brain disorder characterized by unprovoked and recurrent seizures that can affect individuals of any age, gender, race, or background; and

WHEREAS; epilepsy is one of the most common neurological disorders in the world, with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reporting that it affects nearly three million adults in the U.S., including many Wisconsinites; and

WHEREAS; epilepsy is a spectrum disorder comprised of multiple diagnoses and experiences, and symptoms may include a wide range of seizure types, severity, comorbidities, and behavior that vary from person to person; and

WHEREAS; while the CDC estimates that less than half of all newly diagnosed epilepsy cases have a known cause, common causes may include cysticercosis infection, stroke, brain tumor, traumatic brain injury, loss of oxygen to the brain, genetic conditions, or other neurological diseases; and

WHEREAS; people with epilepsy require access to affordable, comprehensive, physician-directed, and person-centered healthcare, and delays in accessing effective treatments can increase the likelihood of breakthrough seizures and related complications, such as injury, disability, or Sudden Unexpected Death in Epilepsy; and

WHEREAS; this month, the state of Wisconsin joins all affected individuals, their loved ones, and dedicated advocates and organizations across the state in spreading awareness of epilepsy, supporting continued research, and embracing hope for improved treatments and a cure;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tony Evers, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, do hereby proclaim November 2025 as

EPILEPSY AWARENESS MONTH

throughout the State of Wisconsin, and I commend this observance to all our state's residents.
