WHEREAS; by participating in high-quality computer science activities through age-appropriate curricula, work shadowing, and educational scholarships, Wisconsin students can learn about opportunities in the burgeoning computer science industry and develop critical thinking skills that will serve them throughout their lives; and

WHEREAS; the state of Wisconsin reaffirms its commitment to expanding opportunities for responsible participation in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics education, which includes access to qualified computer science educators and technology in schools; and

WHEREAS; this week, the state of Wisconsin joins computer science students, educators, programmers, developers, and other professionals in celebrating Computer Science Education Week and thanks them for their ongoing contributions to the state;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tony Evers, Governor of the State of Wisconsin,
do hereby proclaim December 8 – 14, 2025, as
