WHEREAS; narcolepsy can affect people of all ages and, while it affects approximately 135,000 to 200,000 people in the United States, the condition remains underdiagnosed, and is often misdiagnosed, with research suggesting that only 25 percent of people with narcolepsy have been diagnosed and are receiving treatment; and

WHEREAS; narcolepsy impacts people neurologically, socially, and emotionally, and symptoms—especially when undiagnosed—can lead to accidents, injuries, and problems with learning and working; and

WHEREAS; today, the state of Wisconsin joins all individuals affected by narcolepsy, advocates, and organizations across our state and country, including Narcolepsy Network, in spreading awareness of narcolepsy and working to support all those impacted by the disorder;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tony Evers, Governor of the State of Wisconsin,
