WHEREAS; located on the short arm of the 19th chromosome, the CACNA1A gene is involved in communication between neurons in the brain, and a change in this gene can impact the function of the encoded calcium channel, affecting the release of neurotransmitters, according to the CACNA1A Foundation; and

WHEREAS; individuals diagnosed with a CACNA1A variation may experience neurodevelopmental differences, including epilepsy, ataxia, migraines, cerebellar atrophy, and eye movement disorders; and

WHEREAS; in addition to a range of neurodevelopmental differences, affected individuals can also experience life-changing neurological emergencies, including hemiplegic migraine attacks, strokes, comas, seizure emergencies, and cerebral edema; and

WHEREAS; while certain medications and dietary changes can treat CACNA1A variation symptoms, treatment options are limited, and there is no known cure; and

WHEREAS; today, the state of Wisconsin joins affected individuals and their families, along with dedicated advocates and organizations across the state, in raising awareness of CACNA1A variations and the health issues connected to this chromosomal difference;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tony Evers, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, do hereby proclaim March 19 2023 as

CACNA1A AWARENESS DAY

throughout the State of Wisconsin and I commend this observance to all our state's residents.
