WHEREAS; in addition to vaccines, science has brought antibiotics, surgery, sanitation, increased agricultural yields, pasteurization, safe drinking water, and so many more interventions that have doubled the human lifespan in little more than a century; and

WHEREAS; thanks to science, people in Wisconsin and around the world have experienced longer and healthier lives, greater convenience and comfort, and enhanced prosperity and quality of life; and

WHEREAS; with the challenges facing the world today, from the ongoing coronavirus pandemic to the increasingly evident effects of climate change, it has never been more essential to listen to experts in the scientific community and to trust science; and

WHEREAS; today, the state of Wisconsin celebrates all those working in the fields of research, technology, science education, and medicine and encourages all Wisconsinites to reflect on and share how advances in science have bettered their lives and those of their loved ones;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tony Evers, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, do hereby proclaim March 26 2023 as

NATIONAL SCIENCE APPRECIATION DAY

throughout the State of Wisconsin and I commend this observance to all our state's residents.
