

WHEREAS; ensuring the health and wellness of all mothers and babies—from pregnancy and childbirth to postpartum and beyond—must be top a priority for our state; and

WHEREAS; the state of Wisconsin recognizes that structural racism, discrimination, and bias embedded in our society and institutions disproportionately prevent Black mothers from receiving the proper prenatal and postnatal care they need, resulting in disparate maternal health outcomes which can have tragic consequences; and

WHEREAS; Black mothers in Wisconsin are five times more likely than their white peers to die from complications of pregnancy and childbirth, underscoring the urgent need to improve our maternal care systems and invest in improving Black maternal health outcomes; and


WHEREAS; this week, the state of Wisconsin joins advocates, medical professionals, elected officials, and dedicated individuals, families, and organizations across our state in spreading awareness of maternal health issues facing Black mothers, supporting our state’s Black mothers and babies, promoting initiatives to reduce maternal morbidity and mortality, and working to eliminate existing disparities and inequities in our maternal healthcare system;
