

WHEREAS; tornadoes can cause significant devastation to public and private property and have the potential to present a great risk to the safety of everyone in Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS; severe thunderstorms can produce powerful wind gusts, large hail, flood-producing heavy rains, and dangerous lightning, which can also pose a threat to the safety and property of all Wisconsinites; and

WHEREAS; according to the National Weather Service, Wisconsin had 28 confirmed tornadoes in 2022 and, on October 12, experienced an outbreak of seven tornadoes, demonstrating that the threat of tornadoes extends well beyond the summer months; and

WHEREAS; tornadoes, severe storms, flooding, and strong winds have caused hundreds of millions of dollars in damage to homes, businesses, and local government infrastructure in Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS; on Thursday, April 20, 2023, Wisconsin residents are participating in a statewide tornado drill at 1:45 p.m. and 6:45 p.m., during which they are encouraged to practice going to their tornado shelter locations and discuss emergency preparedness with their families; and

WHEREAS; this month, the state of Wisconsin joins Wisconsin Emergency Management and its ReadyWisconsin campaign in spreading awareness of the dangers of tornadoes and other severe weather hazards, as well as the actions which all Wisconsinites can take to keep themselves and their families safe;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tony Evers, Governor of the State of Wisconsin,
