

WHEREAS; the race wage gap and the gender wage gap refer to the observed disparities in earnings between workers of different races and genders, and have persisted for generations; and

WHEREAS; these disparities persist in part due to institutionalized discrimination, and women of color are disproportionately affected, experiencing a wage gap that intersects gender and race; and

WHEREAS; while the average woman in the United States makes 81 cents for every dollar made by the average man, Black women make 62 cents for every dollar made by white, non-Hispanic men once this gap is broken down by race and gender; and

WHEREAS; Black women have always had the highest labor force participation among American women – due to the legal, social, and economic factors that have historically given them no other choice – and, even today, more than 80 percent of Black mothers are the primary or sole providers for their families; and

WHEREAS; we recognize that achieving equal pay for Black women and increasing their representation in high-wage jobs is essential to the prosperity of our state’s families, communities, and overall economy; and

WHEREAS; every year, Black Women’s Equal Pay Day is observed on the approximate day into the new year that a Black woman must work in order to earn what a white, non-Hispanic man earned on average in the previous year; and

WHEREAS; today, the state of Wisconsin reaffirms its commitment to the principle of equal pay for equal work, expanding employment and professional advancement opportunities for Black women, and working towards a more just and equitable economy and society;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tony Evers, Governor of the State of Wisconsin,
do hereby proclaim August 13, 2020, as

BLACK WOMEN’S EQUAL PAY DAY

throughout the State of Wisconsin and I commend this observance
to all our state’s residents.
