

WHEREAS; for over 30 years, Hispanic Heritage Month has been celebrated across the United States to recognize the countless social, cultural, economic, and historical contributions of United States residents who trace their roots to Spain, Mexico, Puerto Rico, and the Spanish-speaking nations of Central America, South America, and the Caribbean; and

WHEREAS; Hispanic Heritage Month begins on September 15 in honor of the independence day of five Central American countries, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua; and

WHEREAS; the most recent data from the United States Census Bureau estimates that Hispanic and Latino residents comprise more than 18 percent of the United States population, including an estimated 7.5 percent of Wisconsin's population, making up the second-largest racial or ethnic group in the country and the fastest growing constituency within our state; and

WHEREAS; Hispanic leaders continuously strengthen local economies and communities through entrepreneurship and contributions to the arts, industry, government, education, healthcare, and more, and according to a study by the Kauffman Foundation, in 2021, Hispanic or Latino individuals started new businesses at a rate faster than has been seen in more than a decade; and

WHEREAS; Hispanic leaders have also been, and continue to be, prominent voices in many of our nation's social and political movements, advocating for issues that affect the Hispanic community—including education, housing, economic prosperity, civil rights, and immigration reform—and throughout the 20th century, in particular, were critical players in the efforts to promote equity and opportunity for students and to advance labor rights and protections for workers; and

WHEREAS; Wisconsin is home to a vibrant and growing Hispanic community, and this month, the state of Wisconsin joins the many organizations throughout our state that work tirelessly to advance the economic and social interests of the Hispanic community in reflecting on the cultural heritage, collective resilience, and countless contributions of Hispanic Wisconsinites to our state and to our country;
