

WHEREAS; on November 7, 1785, the Reverend Samson Occom, a member of the Mohegan nation and a co-founder of the Brothertown Indians, recorded in his journal that “we proceeded to form into a body politick; we named our town by name of Brothertown, in Indian Eeyamquittoowauconnuck”; and

WHEREAS; elected in accordance with the Brothertown Indian Constitution, the Brothertown Indian Nation Council is the governing body of the Brothertown Indians; and

WHEREAS; it is the duty and privilege of the Brothertown Indian Nation Council to act as guardians of the Nation’s sovereignty and to advocate for the welfare of its people; and

WHEREAS; it is critical that the Brothertown Indian Nation Council honor those generations that have come before and ensure that the history and teachings of the Nation are preserved and shared with future generations; and

WHEREAS; today, the state of Wisconsin joins the Brothertown Indian Nation Council and all Tribal members in celebrating this anniversary, which serves as an important expression of the inherent sovereignty of the Brothertown Indians;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tony Evers, Governor of the State of Wisconsin,
do hereby proclaim November 7, 2020, as

EEYAMQUITTOOWAUCONNUCK (BROTHERTOWN) DAY

throughout the State of Wisconsin and I commend this observance
to all our state’s residents.
